The following autobiography was written by Larry Kruse.

Free Flight and Me

For over five decades I have been inspired by flight - an inspiration which began, to a large degree, from being raised on the Great High Plains where hawks, Golden Eagles, and buzzards drifted effortlessly through the warm rising air as fixtures of my early boyhood. I remember the thrill of watching a nickel glider catch a thermal for the first time, and my brother and I chasing it on our bikes for miles on a dusty, dirt road before it capriciously came down and landed in a fresh cow pie.

As I grew up, that fascination with flight turned into the usual spate of building many Comet kits ordered by mail, always accompanied by the agony of going to the post office every day in the hope that the box from America's Hobby Center had arrived. Two slightly older neighbors urged me along. Although both of them mainly flew control line, they occasionally dabbled in free flight. I can still close my eyes and see Fred McKee's *Ramrod 600*, woefully underpowered by a Cameron .19, yet capable of awe-inspiring flights, hanging just above the setting sun and motionless in the still evening air.

During high school, I turned away from modeling aircraft and toward designing and building futuristic 1/12 scale cars for the General Motors-sponsored Fisher Body Craftsman's Guild. That experience was invaluable to my return to aircraft modeling because it taught me that I could start with a blank piece of paper and an idea, and come up with an object of beauty and wonder (at least to my eyes!). Later, when I returned to modeling, only those airplanes I designed myself had any special meaning to me and satisfied the aesthetic needs within.

I began competitive flying in the early 1970s after college by attending my first contest and winning my first trophy in Hand Launch Glider. Before the contest I was inspired by a seminal article on HLGs written by Dick Mathis, Kit Bays, and Tom Peadon that appeared in *Flying Models* in July of 1970. In fact, my first published modeling article in 1973 was entitled, "From Theory to Trophy" and detailed my preparation for entering duration free flight competition and flying the HLG event.

From that point on I began publishing designs, both my own and those of others whom I felt should have some exposure to the modeling world, now totaling some 80 different aircraft models. Over the past 40-plus years, I've written for all of the major commercial modeling publications (some now defunct), and estimate that the total volume of work stands at over 800 articles. That total includes construction articles, kit and product reviews, Nats and other special meet coverages, building hints and tips, and my monthly column in *Flying Models* magazine.

The monthly column came about through a request by the then-editor of *Flying Models*, Bob Hunt. Bob wanted to begin a monthly column that aimed itself at the average free flight modeler - one who perhaps was just getting into the hobby or just returning - and one who was in need of some down-to-earth common sense advice and information. "FF Sport" seemed like a natural name for the column at the time, and still speaks to its purpose, I think. And, having now completed over 30 years of cranking out "FF Sport" on a monthly basis, it only seems right to continue as long as readers exhibit interest and the editorial staff at *Flying Models* will put up with me.

My modeling interests within free flight have changed over the years, starting with duration events and the moving to free flight scale in a serious way during the 80s to chase a goal of winning every free flight scale event at the Nationals, both indoor and outdoor. That quest ended in eleven first-place Nats trophies in Rubber Scale (indoor and outdoor); Peanut Scale (indoor and outdoor); and outdoor Power Scale. Along the way, I also collected three National Association of Scale Aeromodelers Achievement Awards, and a proxied first place in Indoor Bostonian for Don DeLoach thrown in for good measure.

In 1992 through 1996, I took a hiatus from modeling to concentrate on completing a doctoral program at Oklahoma State University. Much to my surprise, when I came back to modeling my focus had changed. While I still hold the highest rank possible in the Flying Aces Club, lately my modeling interests have come full circle. I'm now back into duration events, particularly the Nostalgia planes of the 50s that eluded me as a boy (chiefly because of the cost of the engines at that time); today's version of the HLG for those past their prime, the catapult glider; and small rubber jobs like the P-30, which remains amazingly intriguing despite (or perhaps because of) its inherent limitations.

Since my work in the real world was as an administrator, prior to my retirement and since that time, I've tried to make it a point to become involved in modeling in an administrative fashion as well. I've been one of the founders of a modeling club; gotten over 200 Cub Scouts in a gym to fly Delta Darts each fall; served as a CD for contests; judged scale events at regional meets and the Nats; written AMA rules proposals for improving the hobby; chaired the NFFS Ten Models of the Year committee; helped establish the NFFS Scholarship program as a sitting committee member; and currently serve as a mentor for a state-wide model competition at our local technical school.

Beyond all of the above, I've enjoyed and treasured the many friends and acquaintances that modeling interaction permits. Those of us involved in free flight are a small and select group, but one populated by the best people in the world. Because of our association with each other and

with our segment of the hobby, we are uniquely blessed as human beings. I am grateful to be one of the chosen few who find magic in models that fly free.

Not too long ago, a little blue-haired lady approached me after I'd made a presentation to her club on getting young people involved in modeling. She peered up at me through the glasses perched on her nose and said, "You know, Dr. Kruse, I don't think you've ever grown up!" I replied, "Thank you, ma'am. Nor do I intend to."

The following information was gathered from biographical material submitted to the AMA Model Aviation Hall of Fame by Frank Fanelli in 2014. Larry Kruse was inducted into the Hall of Fame in that same year.
