- 1975: Bachelor of Fine Arts degree in Photography, School of Visual Arts, New York City
- 1985: Joined Brooklyn Skyscrapers, NYC
- 1990-2004: Produced videos of National Championships
- 1998-2001: Editor of *Flyoff*, Brooklyn Skyscraper's club newsletter
- Contest Director for local contests
- 2000-2002: President, Brooklyn Skyscrapers club

Alan Abriss has been a modeler for forty-six years. "My dad started a Guillow's *Neuport 28* but never finished it. [At the age of seven] I found it in a closet and asked if I could try to finish it. I did, but being a Guillow's model, it never did fly." The hardest part of building that first model was "learning to cover it with silk. Building the framework was easy. I enjoyed the fact that the model flew and I didn't crash it!" "[My] family moved to Queens, New York in 1961 where I found a group of teenagers flying Control Line and they let the 'little kid' join them." His second model was a Goldberg Control Line *Shoestring* from a kit, with a Johnson .32 engine. It was built with "minor assistance from my Dad."

In 1975, Alan earned a Bachelor of Fine Arts degree in Photography at New York's School of Visual Arts. Using this degree to promote aeromodeling, between 1992 and 2004 he produced "model airplane video tapes. Each tape documents various events at that year's Nats." His videos have won him several honors: the "Queens Public TV's Best Director for a Performance Video and Best Videographer for a Series" awards in 1993 and the "Queens Public TV's Best Producer for a Performance" award in 1994.

Alan's participation in clubs and contests started in the 1980s and 1990s. In 1985, he joined a New York City-based club, the Brooklyn Skyscrapers. His first competition was in that year, at the "Bam Bash." At thirty-three, Alan flew a "Peck *One Nite 28* in P-30 rubber" and won third place with a fly-off. His participation in the AMA Nats first occurred in 1995 at the age of 43. He has competed continually since then. "In 1998, I designed and successfully flew my own 1/2A Free Flight design. [I] scaled it down for Pee Wee 30 and finally in 2004 finished first at the Nats."

Alan was elected president of the Brooklyn Skyscrapers in 2000 and held that office through 2002. He served as "editor of *Flyoff*, the Skyscraper's club newsletter, from 1998 to 2001" and as a contest director for "local club contests... too many to count." It has been twenty-plus years since he joined the Skyscrapers, and he continues to be an active member to this day.
