The following represents the autobiography of Bob Noll, submitted in May of 2005. Bob was inducted into the AMA Model Aviation Hall of Fame in 2007.

#### **Biography of Bob Noll** Leader Member, AMA 12325

## The Beginning

I became interested in Radio Control aircraft while in high school in 1953. Two men who worked at the local hobby shop in Allentown, PA fueled my interest. A few trips to the flying site in Fogelsville, PA and I was hooked. I had built many solid models from wood kits for several years but the sight of seeing a plane fly with nothing attached was almost more than I could handle.

It was then that I built my first plane, a *Royal Rudderbug* from a Berkeley kit and equipped it with a Webra .15 diesel and an Esco-Lorenze transmitter and receiver using a Babcock compound escapement. I first competed in pattern in 1954 with a deBolt *LiveWire Champion* using the same radio equipment and placed third at my first pattern contest with the Champ. At this point, I was hooked on Radio Control flying and building for life.

#### Competition

My first contest in 1954 was in Easton, PA and I left with a trophy in Radio Control Rudder Only. This was just the beginning of years of contest flying in many categories in local, regional, and national contests.

I have been competitive in pattern, scale, and pylon racing and have many Nationals trophies in each of these categories. I have flown in hundreds of contests and approximately twenty AMA Nationals.

- Successfully competed and trophied at the AMA Nationals in Formula I Pylon, Quickee 500 Pylon, Designer Scale and Precision Aerobatics.
- NMPRA Season Champion in Formula II in 1968.
- NMPRA Season Second Place in Formula II in 1969.
- Place fourth at AMA Nats in Designer Scale in 1974.
- Member of the USA Pylon Team in 1974 flying a scratch built racer *Bobcat* designed by Bob Violet.
- Received many trophies for Pattern and Scale at Vintage RC Society Reunions.

• Still competing in Quickee 500 Pylon Racing and F3A Precision Aerobatics.

## Experiments

- Experimented with foam wing cutting during early sixties with my friend, Ed Izzo, who is accredited with the development of this building technique. During these early days, Ed and I used several different techniques and tools for this process.
- Experimented with smoke systems which I used on the Steen *Skybolt* I designed and flew to a fourth place at the 1976 Dayton Nats. I was told at the time that my *Skybolt* was the first to use smoke in Radio Control Scale at a Nats.
- I have done an extensive amount of propeller experimentation for my club to address the problem of high sound levels and was responsible for my club's implementation of a sound limit and monitoring system at our field.
- Designed a "Flight Control Center" for my club. This project provided for an improved method of frequency control at our field. An article about the Flight Control Center was published in <u>RC Modeler</u>.
- Designed a set of tools for use when aligning wings, tail surfaces, and fuselage on a
  precision aerobatics airplane. I market these tools as "Bob's Alignment Gadget" and
  "Bob's Height Gauges." Both are featured in a video that I had made by Robin's View
  Productions (RVP). I have a series of four widely acclaimed videos released through
  RVP about building precision pattern models.

# **Designer and Master Craftsman**

- Published an article (<u>MAN</u> 4/69) for, and built, a deBolt design, *The Continental 600*, for Formula II Pylon Racing. This plane won the 1968 NMPRA National Championship for Formula II.
- Built a scale *Nieuport 27* WWI biplane for the original Rhinebeck WWI competition. This plane won first place twice in Scale at Rhinebeck.
- Designer of the Yankee, a pattern airplane that was published in Model Airplane News.
- Designer of the Steen Skybolt scale airplane that was published in Model Airplane News.
- Ten years of building custom F3A Precision Aerobatics planes for top competitors around the world.
- Guest presenter of building techniques at several radio control forums in the U.S. and Canada.
- Wrote many articles on building techniques for <u>Model Aviation</u> and <u>Flying Models</u> magazines. I am continuing to write articles on building for these magazines.

# Leadership

I have been a member of one of the oldest Radio Control clubs in the U.S., namely the Aeroguidance Society Inc., since 1959. During this time, I have been the club's President, Vice-President, Secretary, Newsletter Editor, and a Board Member many times. This club will be holding their 50<sup>th</sup> annual Pattern Contest in 2005. I have been a Contest Director for these since 1965.

- Member of the Radio Control Aerobatics Contest Board for six years in the 1960s.
- Eastern Vice President of the United Scale and Pattern Judges Association for four years.
- Became an AMA Leader Member in 1980.
- President of the Vintage RC Society since 2002, an AMA Special Interest Group.
- Honored with a Lifetime Membership in the National Society of Radio Control Aerobatics (NSRCA) for being the AMA Nats event director for three years and making significant improvements to these events.

## **Contest Leadership**

- Obtained my Contest Director's license in 1960 and have been the Contest Director of over 50 sanctioned events for the Aeroguidance Society and the Vintage RC Society.
- Event Director for Radio Control Precision Aerobatics for three AMA Nationals in 1998, 1999, and 2000.
- Conducted many judging seminars for the National Society of Radio Control Aerobatics.
- Judged at four Tournament of Champions in Las Vegas.
- Judged at four F3A Team Selection Contests.
- Site Director for the 1999 F3A World Championships.
- Contest Director for the U.S. F3A Team Selection Contest in 2000.

- Video Principle for a set of four "Absolute Accuracy" videos produced by Robin's View Productions.
- Custom builder of F3A planes for top competitors around the world from 1993 to 2004.

#### **Education Involvement**

 Made many presentations to local service clubs on the hobby/sport of radio control plane building and flying. Assisted in several AMA Delta Dart programs with Boy Scouts in the Binghamton, NY area.

#### Awards

- Won many trophies for my scale and aerobatic models at the WRAM's show, Toledo show and several other model shows and forums.
- Received the Spirit of Selinsgrove Award presented by the Vintage RC Society.
- Received the Vintage RC Society's "Concours" Award for a replica of my first Radio Control plane, the Berkeley *Royal Rudderbug*.
- Received the Vintage RC Society's "Concours" Award for my scratch built Jim Kirkland *Beachcomber*.
- Received the Outstanding Service Award from the Aero Radio Club of Syracuse for conducting precision aerobatics training sessions at their contest for 6 years.


